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## PREFACE

The Bermuda Digest of Statistics was first produced in 1973. The publication provides an annual summary of various socio-economic statistics designed for convenient reference. The tables are grouped by theme to form a total of 10 sections. Unless otherwise stated, the statistics are for Bermuda.

The name of the department or organization whose reports or published statements were used is noted under each table. The assistance provided by these departments or organizations is acknowledged gratefully.

The figures in the Digest are mainly annual totals and totals for calendar months. Wherever possible, and space permitting, series have been provided for the period 2014 to 2023. Figures for earlier years may be found in previous editions of the Digest.

### COVID-19

The coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic led to restrictions being imposed by Government (e.g. curfews, limited group sizes, reduced business hours and temporary business closures), cancellations (e.g. cruises and flights) and changes in behavior (e.g. less desire to travel and dine out) as mitigation efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 commencing in 2020. Government's pandemic-related restrictions eased over the course of 2022 and ceased on November 30 that year. Therefore, readers should take the pandemic into account when interpreting the 2020 to 2022 data.

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## **OVERVIEW**

Note: Unless otherwise stated, facts and figures are for 2023.

## Section I – Population and Vital Statistics

Accounting for birth and death data subsequent to the 2016 Population and Housing Census, Bermuda's estimated year-end population continued to fall this past year to 63,356 (Table 1.1). For the sixth consecutive year, the number of deaths exceeded the number of births, resulting in a population decline of 186 (Table 1.1). The number of births decreased year-to-year by 9% to 436 for another record low since *Digest of Statistics* records began in 1940 (Table 1.7). Furthermore, the number of deaths increased by 6% to 622 (Table 1.7).

There were 310 marriages performed on island, a decline of 8% over the past year. The number of divorces filed increased by 10% to 136 while divorces granted fell by 25% to 85 (Table 1.7).

## Section II – Education

Total school enrolment decreased by 3% year-over-year to an unprecedented low of 8,424 students. Females comprised 49% of the public school system, 51% of private school pupils and 59% of Bermuda College students (Table 2.1).

Enrolment for Government schools fell 5%, making another record low, with declines recorded every year for the past decade. Private school enrolment increased slightly whereas Bermuda College student figures dipped by 4% over the past year (Table 2.1).

Preschool and primary school enrolment both increased marginally, with the growth in the latter partly due to the re-introduction of P7 in selected Government schools (Tables 2.2 and 2.5). Meanwhile, middle school enrolment decreased by 7%, reaching its lowest level since the inception of the middle school system in 1997 (Table 2.3). Secondary school enrolment fell by 4%, also hitting a record low (Table 2.4).

### Section III – Health

In 2021, deaths caused by neoplasms (cancers) represented the largest share of the total at 23%, aside from causes of death categorized as other. The newly introduced COVID-19 caused 14% of all deaths in 2021 compared to 2% in 2020. Excluding other causes of deaths, male deaths were most likely to be caused by circulatory diseases whereas female deaths were most commonly due to neoplasms (Table 3.1).

The number of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) reported increased by 58% from the previous year. Forty-seven per cent of all STIs were reported by persons in the 20-to-29-year age group. Of all patients, 67% were females. Chlamydia has been the most common STI since 1991; this past year it made up 78% of all cases (Table 3.2).

The number of immunizations for travel purposes for selected diseases more than doubled year-over-year, increasing by 107%. Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis was the leading vaccination recorded accounting for 43% of all travel immunizations (Table 3.3).

## Section IV – Labour

From 2022 to 2023, there was an increase of 952 occupied jobs or 3%. Professionals, Senior Officials and Managers and Service Workers, Shop and Market Sales Workers were the leading occupational groups, each accounting for 20% of the total. Decreases in jobs occurred in two of the ten occupational groups, namely Clerks and Elementary Occupations. Occupied jobs increased in all age groups except 55-59 years (Table 4.1).

Standard Work Permits allow local organisations to employ foreign nationals if Bermudians, spouses of Bermudians or Permanent Resident Certificate holders are unqualified, unsuitable or unavailable. The total number of work permits issued to non-Bermudians who are not married to Bermudians increased by 19% year-to-year. The vast majority of work permits were held in the private sector at 96%. The duration of "two to five years" permits made up more than half of all work permits issued for the private sector. For the public sector employees, work permits with a length of "two to five years" also were the most common and comprised 68% of the total (Table 4.4).

## Section V – Prices and Wages

Food retail prices rose for 37 of the 40 selected items for which data was available during the past year. Lettuce had the largest price percentage increase while apples and raisins had the largest percentage decrease year-to-year. Over the ten-year period, the greatest percentage increase was for baby food and the largest decrease was for chicken legs (Table 5.2).

There are 26 selected items across the 6 categories of Beverages, Household & Personal, Liquor & Tobacco, Fuel & Power, Transportation and Recreation & Entertainment. In the past year, 13 prices increased, 4 decreased, 8 remained unchanged and 1 was unavailable. Year-toyear, the largest percentage increase in price was for powdered household cleaner whereas coffee had the greatest percentage decrease. Over the past decade, the daily newspaper had the largest percentage increase while electricity rates had the greatest percentage decrease (Table 5.2 cont'd).

## Section VI – Finance

Government expenditure exceeded revenue by an estimated \$44.0 million in fiscal year 2023/24, marking the twenty-first consecutive year of a Government deficit. The deficit increased by 57% from the previous year. Payroll tax remained the largest contributor to revenue at 45% while wages & salaries accounted for the largest share of expenditure at 34% (Table 6.1).

The Corporation of Hamilton total deficit of \$26.5 million in 2023 was the highest of the tenyear period. The notable deficit in 2014 and substantial surplus in 2016 was influenced by the initial loss on the guarantee to Mexico Infrastructure Finance (MIF) followed by its derecognition two years later. The reinstatement of this loss in 2023 was the main contributor to the deficit. Taxes (32%) and the loss on the guarantee to MIF (42%) comprised the largest shares of revenue and expenditure, respectively (Table 6.3).

The Corporation of St. George recorded a surplus of \$1.9 million, representing a 332% increase year-to-year. The leading revenue and expenditure items were net wharfage which comprised 71% of revenue and staff and office expenses which represented 80% of expenditure (Table 6.4).

## Section VII – External Trade

The value of imports decreased by 2% year-over-year but remained above pre-pandemic levels. Transport Equipment represented the largest annual growth at 20% whereas Fuels had the largest percentage decrease at 31%. Food, Beverages and Tobacco was the largest commodity group as it comprised 22% of total imports (Table 7.1).

By country or region, the Caribbean had the largest percentage increase in the value of imports at 71% and Canada had the largest percentage decrease at 53%. The majority of imports were from the United States throughout the period (Table 7.2).

There was a 33% decline in the value of goods exported over the past year. Furthermore, this year's value was \$4.5 million less than the pre-pandemic 2019 value (Table 7.3).

## Section VIII – Transport

The number of registered road vehicles increased by 1% this year, reaching the highest level since 2009 (Table 8.1). For the third consecutive year, private cars comprised 46% of the total followed by motorcycles and scooters at 36% (Table 8.1). Public passenger road transport receipts increased by 14% but remained below pre-pandemic levels (Table 8.2).

Year-over-year, the number of reported road traffic accidents decreased by 14% (Table 8.3). Private cars and motorcycles continued to be the leading vehicles involved in these accidents, respectively (Table 8.3). Inattention was the cause of 21% of all accidents (Table 8.4).

Total road casualties fell by 3% during the past year (Table 8.5). Serious road casualties decreased by 7% while road traffic fatalities increased by 18% (Table 8.5). Minor injuries fell by 3% and comprised 81% of total road casualties (Table 8.5). Traffic fatalities involving motorcycles made up 85% of the total (Table 8.6).

The arrival of overseas vessels decreased by 5% this year. Yachts comprised 61% of the total whereas ships comprised the remaining 39% (Table 8.7).

## **Section IX – Visitor Arrivals**

Total visitor arrivals increased by 30% this past year but remained below pre-pandemic levels. Air visitor arrivals were 69% of the value in 2019 whereas cruise visitor arrivals represented 98% (Table 9.1).

Cruise passengers comprised 74% of the 710,748 total, the highest proportion over the tenyear period (Table 9.1). Cruise passenger arrivals were 30% higher than the previous year and peaked in July (Table 9.5). Residents from the United States accounted for 88% of all cruise visitors (Table 9.1).

Air visitor arrivals increased by 27% between 2022 and 2023 and July was the peak month (Table 9.5). United States residents represented 72% of air visitor arrivals (Table 9.1).

## Section X – Miscellaneous

The total value of selected domestic agricultural output increased by 6% over the past year to \$5.3 million (Table 10.1). Of this total, the value of vegetables comprised 85% (Table 10.1). Milk production dropped by 8% to another record low (Table 10.2).

The number of applications for planning permission and permitted development permits decreased by 18% over the past year. Permitted developments under the Development & Planning (General Development) Order 1999 comprised 61% of the total (Table 10.5).

The number of completed dwelling units increased by 39% year-over-year. One-bedroom units were the most popular and the most common type of development were apartment buildings (Table 10.4).

The Bermuda Fire and Rescue Service recorded a 6% increase in the number of calls received by their dispatch centre to reach the highest level within the past decade. Fifty-eight per cent of these calls were emergency medical service dispatches sent to the hospital while the remainder were fire dispatches (Table 10.6).







Figure 2.1 (A)




















Figure 2.2 (B)























Figure 2.4 (B)
